Musician to Apply His Expertise to Jewish Liturgical Tradition

Groundbreaking Music for Observance of Selichot

Jay Loomis, a collector and player of unusual wind and percussion instruments, will provide a musical interlude during the observance of Selichot at Congregation Tifereth Israel in Greenport, NY, on Saturday, Sept. 12, at 8:30 p.m. The service will be conducted by Rabbi Myron Fenster.

The observance of Selichot is held traditionally on the Saturday evening preceding Rosh Hashanah, the first of the High Holy Days, a serious, heartfelt and introspective period in the lives of Jews. At the Selichot service, the themes of the High Holy Days are introduced: self-analysis, critique of each individual's life, and a sense of collective responsibility for the sins of fellow Jews. Traditionally, music in a lighter, sprightlier vein is offered, largely because the mood of the observances is forgiveness, Rabbi Fenster says. Jay Loomis had entertained the congregation and members of the North Fork communities at a synagogue-sponsored summer dinner. His music so captivated listeners that he was asked to return to the synagogue to offer music appropriate for the Selichot observance. Loomis is studying Jewish liturgical themes in preparation for the service. It is the first time these folk instruments will be heard during a spiritual observance. Jay Loomis has traveled extensively on four continents in search of unusual wind instruments, most of them wood-carved flutes. Many are Native American; others are from Europe, Asia and Africa. In Sierra Leone, he learned to play the Fula flute from members of the nomadic West African Fulani tribe. While in China, he discovered an instrument with an unusually mellow sound in a public market, and was taught to play it by local musicians. "Flutes and percussion instruments resonate to the folk music of their native origins," Loomis says.

The Year at Congregation Tifereth Israel

When I was young, my father would speak of the wonder-Rabbi of Strelvisk, his home town. Reb Uri the Sereph renown in the Hasidic circles is emblazoned in my memory. When he



died in 1826, they tied ropes around his chair and in no way were they permitted to sit in it. A century later they still spoke of him as a living presence.

The mystique of the man entranced me. Later I was to scour the literature for further details. In a way I have been looking for such a Rebbe all my life. The impact of youth has remained.

These great leaders gave off a special aura. In Lizensk, Berditcher, Lublin and dozens of other towns and villages, Judaism was turned into a sweet adventure, a collective unfolding experience. Oft times they were poor but they strove together for spiritual strength and moral audacity, spurred on by the Rebbe.

And so Reb Uri taught the folks of Strelyisk that each should be like a Sefer Torah. And he spelled it out. In the Torah no two letters may touch or lean on another. Each needs to stand on its own. Yet, if one letter is missing the whole Torah is invalid.

So this is my prayer for the New Year: That each person in our community will stand erect before God, confident, contrite, and contributing and that no one will be missing. Join me, and let us search together.







The Taliban shouted, 'Idiot! I do not need an overpriced tie. I need water! I should kill you, but I must find water first.'



Mel Brooks Starts Nonprofit Foundation To Save Word 'Schmuck'

NEW YORK-Saying he could no longer stand idly by while a vital part of American culture is lost forever, activist and Broadway producer Mel Brooks has founded a private nonprofit organization dedicated to preserving the word "schmuck."

The study indicates that today, when faced with a situation in which one can use a targeted or self-deprecating insult to convey a general feeling of disgust, people are 50 times more likely to use the word "jerk" than "schmuck," 100 times more likely to use "dick," and 15,000 times more likely to use "f**king a**hole."

Perhaps more startling, only 23 percent of men know what schmuck means, and only 1.2 percent of these men are under the age of 78. If such trends continue, Brooks estimates that by 2011, such lesser-used terms as "imbecile," "dummy," "schlub," and "contemptible ne'er-do-well" will all surpass schmuck, which is projected to completely disappear by the year 2020 or whenever Brooks dies.

"Plus, it's just so fun to say," Brooks added. "Schmuck." Many of the foundation's volunteers say they share Brooks' passion for the word "schmuck," as well as his outrage that it is slowly disappearing from everyday use. They claim that if they do not act now, the trend could create a snowball effect.

"Today it's schmuck, tomorrow it might be toochis," said SFS volunteer Harry Steinbergmann, 82. "What's next, schlemiel? Putz? Schlimazel?" Steinbergmann went on to classify this scenario as farcockteh.

"We must save this word!" Brooks said to thunderous applause as those in attendance began chanting "Schmuck! Schmuck! Schmuck!" "How will we be able to charmingly describe someone who acts in an inappropriate manner? Especially given the tragic loss of the word 'schmegeggie' in 2001. So I urge you: Tonight, when you get home, please, call up your family, your friends, your loved ones, and tell them they're a bunch of schmucks."

Hundreds turned out at a Boca Raton , FL demonstration to show their support for the dying word. "I've never told anyone this before," Brooks added, choking back tears, "but my father was a schmuck."

The foundation has already raised more than \$20 million, thanks to donations from supporters such as Jackie Mason, Albert Brooks, the Schtupp Institute, Sen. Russ Feingold (D-WI),
